what's that log cabin?

Sitting pretty in the Falcon Ridge parking lot is a 10' x 10' log cabin. Built over a 12-day period, the cabin is the product of four students taking a log-cabin building course offered by Walter Keller of Elma. Despite close working conditions and four chainsaws a-blazing, the students and instructor came out unscathed and the cabin is awaiting its next life as a lakeside sauna for Falcon Trails. Get ready to sweat and head for the lake. craig christie

Raised in Winnipeg in Norwood, Craig grew attached to the Whiteshell from spending most of his summers at the family cottage at Red Rock. After studying entomology at university (earning a masters degree), and spending a couple of summers at Red Rock at the university’s research camp studying insects, Craig eventually moved permanently to the Whiteshell to work in construction. After a few years, Craig and his wife (and Falcon Trails partner), Barb Hamilton, started Christie Hamilton Construction, building cabins, additions, docks, and more.



While Craig was busy with his business, and growing family, he spent many hours volunteering at the ski hill, then run by the provincial government. Fearing its demise, Craig was instrumental in encouraging Biathlon Manitoba to start using the ski area as its main training centre. It was a great, and successful, idea, but it meant many more volunteer hours developing and building the cross-country trails. For 10 years, Craig did the majority of the trail grooming, again as a volunteer. He also was chief-of-course for two national biathlon events.

wildlife abounds

While savouring the solitude of a winter’s morning at the soon-to-be available remote High Lake cabin, Falcon Trails partners Craig Christie and Barb Hamilton looked out on the frozen lake and were thrilled by the sight of a wolf trotting along the lake. Exterminated from Atlantic provinces, Mexico, and much of the United States, wolves still are relatively common in less populated areas of Canada. Seeing a wolf is exciting, Hearing it howl is truly remarkable.

Head for Falcon, February 8 and 9, and join in the annual Beaver Days festivities. Here are some of the activities you can enjoy at the Ridge: Ski joring, a sport imported from Scandinavia where Laplanders put on skis and harnessed themselves to reindeer to travel. Since we're short on reindeer at Falcon Ridge, we bring in horses from the Falcon Beach Ranch. You can be pulled either on skis or snowboard around a short track for a taste of this fun activity.

Shoot-out at the range gives you a chance to try target shooting at the biathlon range. You don't have to cross-country ski to get there, but if you want to experience the hard work of a biathlon, try skiing to the range and lying down, telling your beating heart to be still as you aim for the target. Sleigh rides, courtesy of Falcon Beach Ranch; Snowblast 2003, a downhill ski demo day from Gord's Ski Centre, sponsored by Volkswagen and Q94; and cross-country ski demos from Salomon.
